Larry Johnson has inaccurately accused Kristie of some pretty absurd tax increases. In a recent mailer, he counted the 2013 tax increase TWICE, and then he neglected to mention that

**Kristie voted to DECREASE TAXES BY 50 percent in 2014.**

During the recession, Larry Johnson and two other city councilmen voted to spend the city's fund balance (savings account) down to dangerous levels that resulted in a lower city bond rating. This meant higher interest rates for the city. It also meant that roads and necessary public safety resources continued to be deferred.

When Kristie Steadman Overson joined the city council in 2012, sales tax revenue had declined by millions of dollars and the city's savings account had been raided. She saw the importance of planning for and investing in the future. A property tax increase was a more prudent choice than cutting essential services. Johnson never proposed cuts to the budget to avoid a tax increase, but conveniently voted "No." The rest of the city council approved the increase so that Taylorsville could invest in economic development, keep up on road repair, and adequately fund public safety. It was a hard decision, but it was the right decision. Had the council not voted to increase taxes at that time, there would not be funds available to invest in the economic development efforts we are beginning to see in the city.
